Friday 6-9pm	<p><u>Hebrew Scripture (Old Testament)</u> You will read most of the Hebrew Scripture over the course of the whole year. There is also a text book which is easy to read.</p>	<p>High compared to the other classes because of the amount of Scripture to read.</p>
Saturday 8-8:20am	<p><u>Morning Prayer</u> This is not a class, but students who wish gather to learn how to pray the daily office and to pray it together before starting class.</p>	<p>Little to none.</p>
Saturday 8:20-8:50am October through January	<p><u>Deacons in the Liturgy</u> This class talks about what deacons do during the church service on various occassions such as baptism, Eucharist, etc. There is a very easy easy optional book.</p>	<p>Little to none.</p>
Saturday 8:20-8:50am February through June	<p><u>Spiritual Practices</u> Light and easy reading. Recommended practice of spiritual practices takes about one-half hour per time. Some will try these practices daily, others with less frequency. But remember that a spiritual practice....takes practice!</p>	<p>Relatively little. The books (2) are very short and easy to read. The amount of time required depends upon the time you engage in the practices.</p>
Saturday 9-11:50am	<p><u>Church History</u> This course covers a breadth of Church history. The reading assignments are not long, but if you are not an historian, the reading may not be quick and easy. The course is offered over a two year period.</p>	<p>High Due to the content of reading.</p>
Saturday 1-2:50pm	<p><u>Theology</u> Learn what we believe and how we understand the nature of God, creation, the Trinity, heaven, the sacraments, and more. The book is very readable and the class discussions lively.</p>	<p>Fairly low. Readings are short and accessible, however you will exercise your noodle.</p>
Saturday 3-4:50pm September through January	<p><u>Anglicanism</u> An accessible book that includes some history. Written by a former Archbishop of Canterbury. A must take to understand the nature of Anglicanism.</p>	<p>Moderate An average of three chapters per month of reading.</p>
Saturday 3-4:50pm February through June	<p><u>Christian Ethics</u> TBD</p>	
Saturday 5-6pm	<p><u>Living our Faith in the Community</u> A book discussion reflecting on how we live out our faith in the community. Some books are read and discussed over a two class period. Others are at a pace of a book a meeting. The books are pretty light reads. Examples include <i>Radical Sending, When Helping Hurts, Doing Justice, Pastoral Theology for Public Ministry.</i></p>	<p>Easy to Moderate The books are not by any means difficult, but you do need to read about a half book to full book per month.</p>
